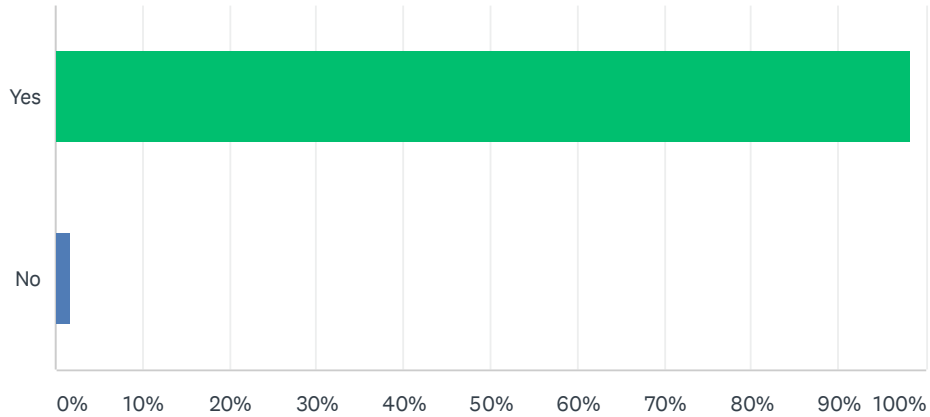


Q1 Did you participate in the reproductive health classes this year? (If your answer is no, please go directly to question #7)

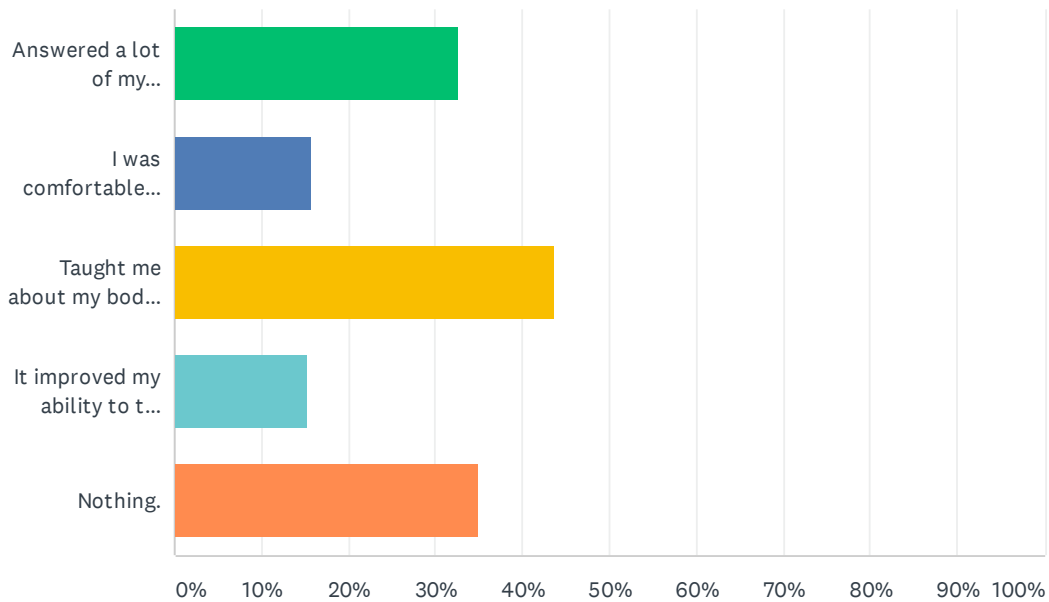

Q2 What did you like about the puberty and sexuality education unit? (You can choose more than one answer).

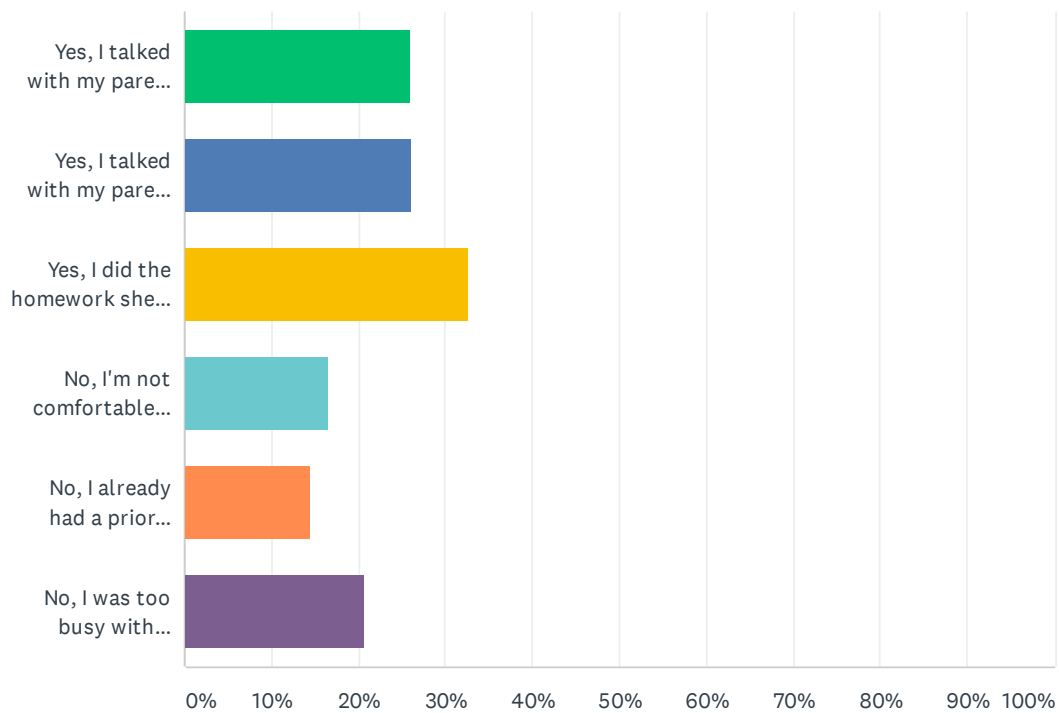

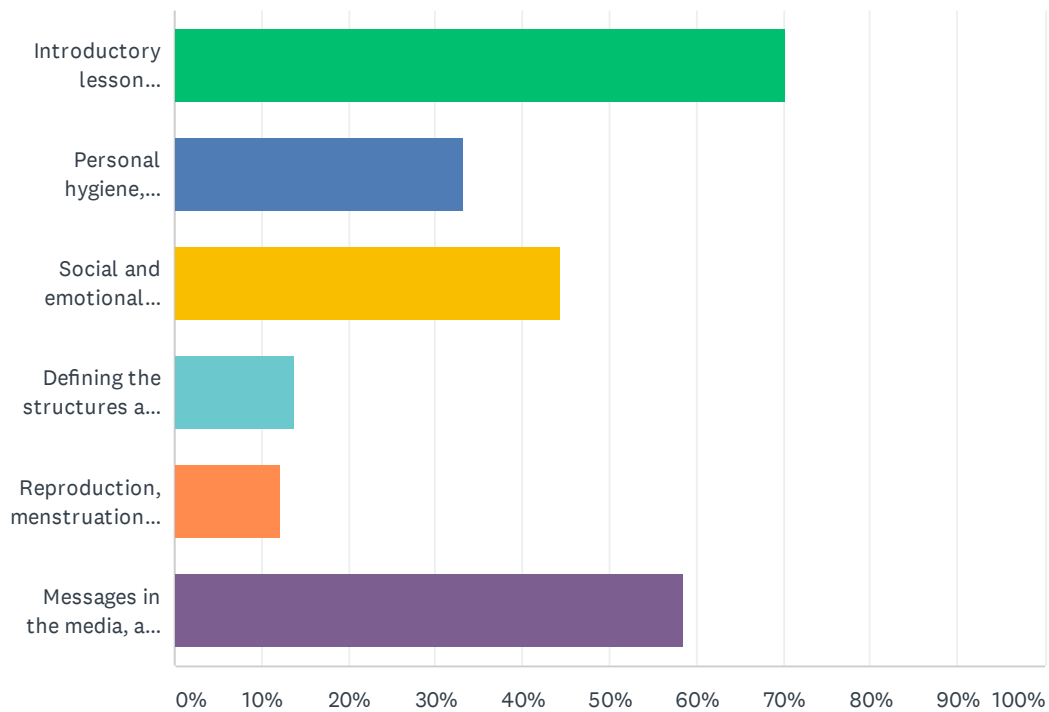

Q4 Which of the following lessons do you think boys and girls could learn together in the same classroom?

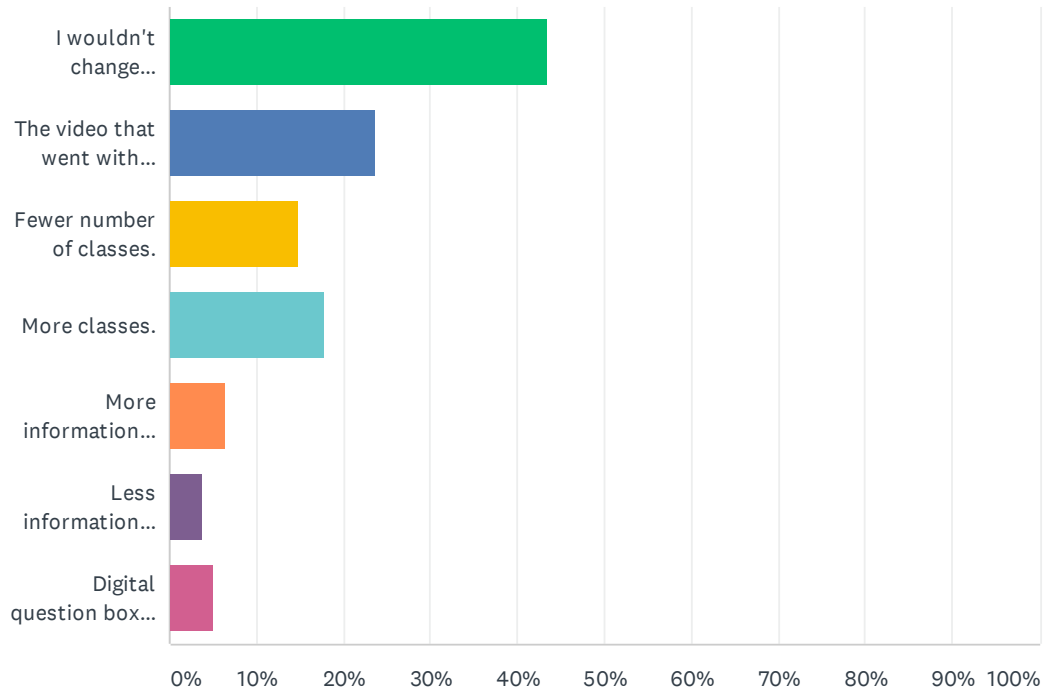

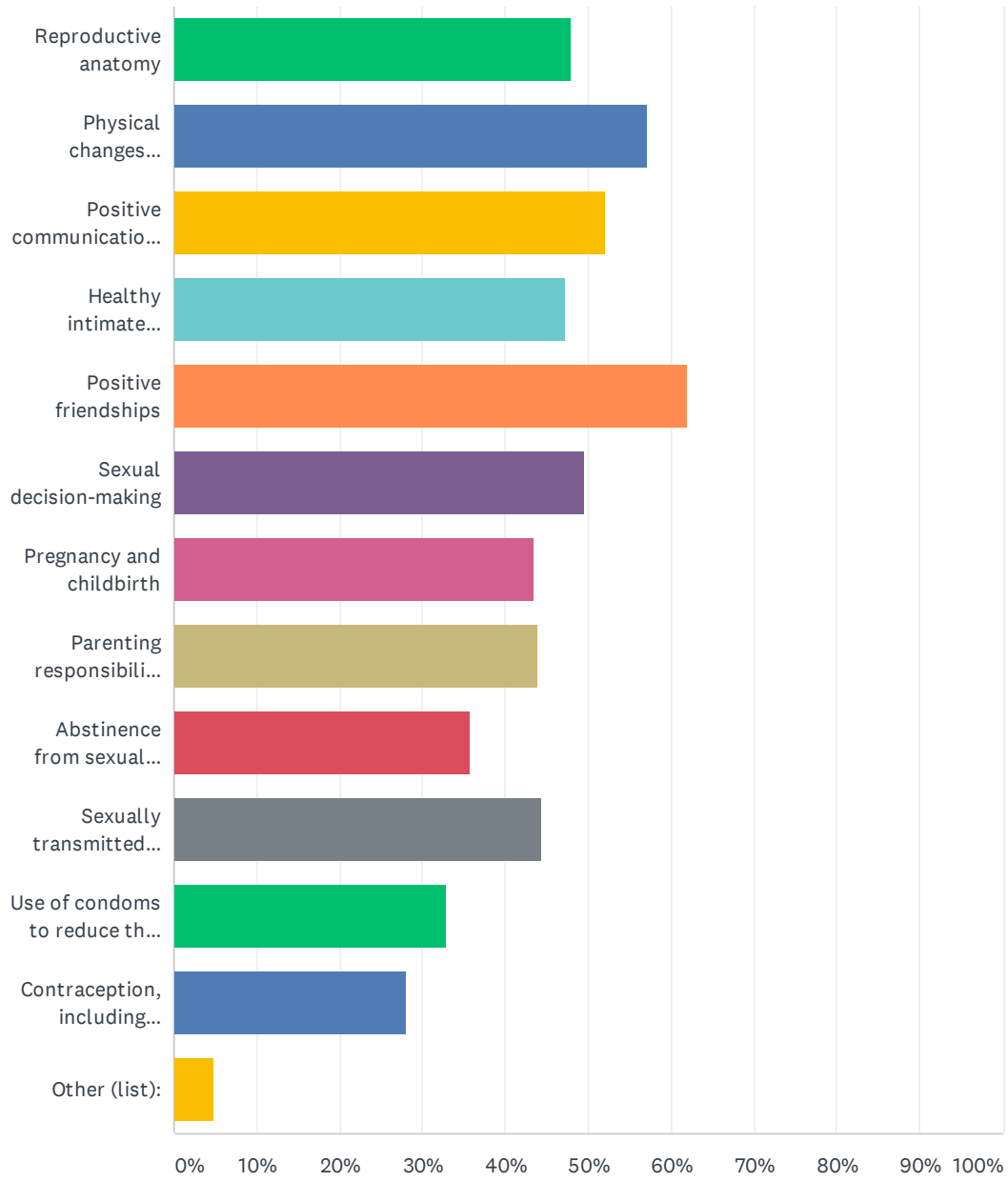

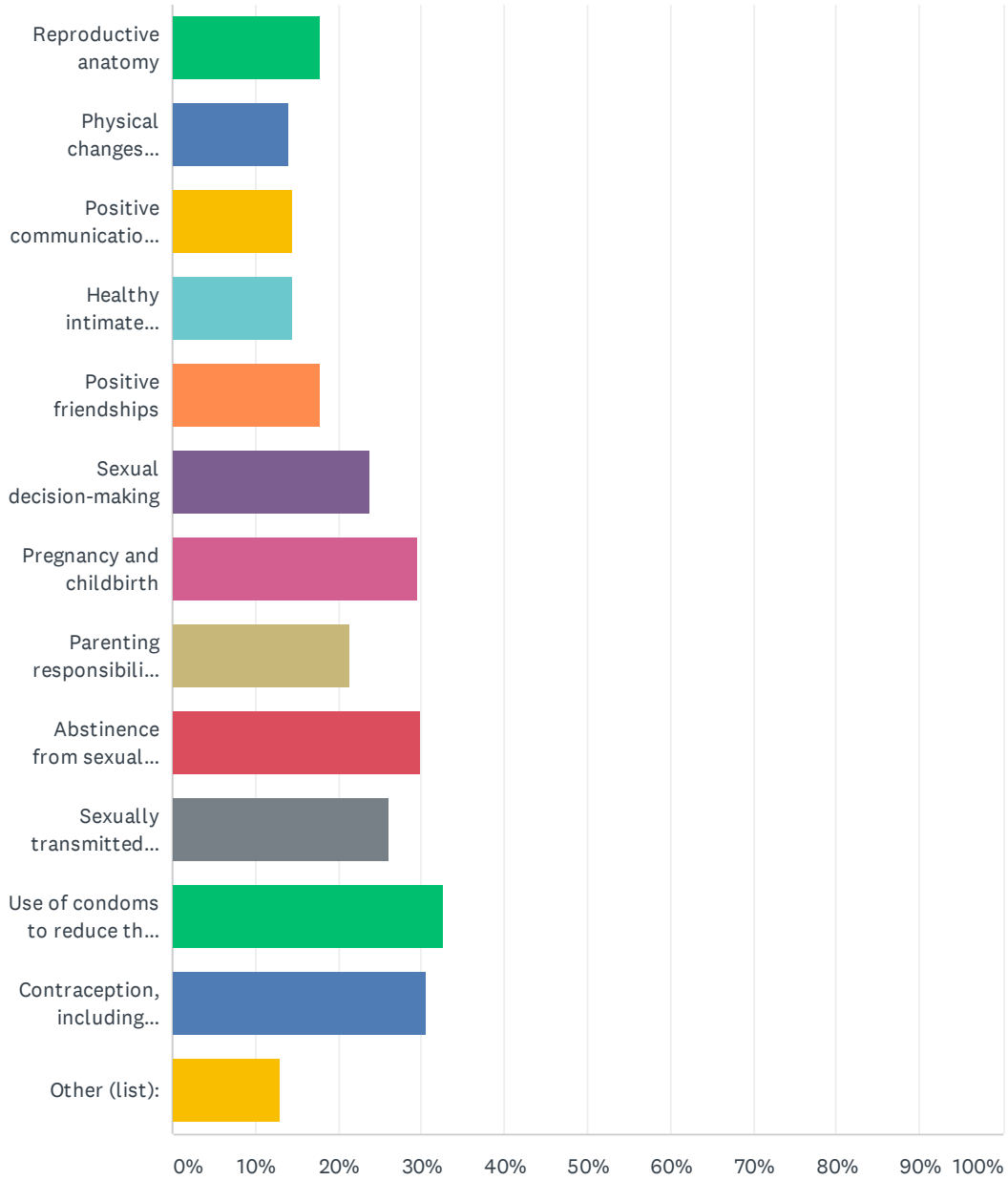

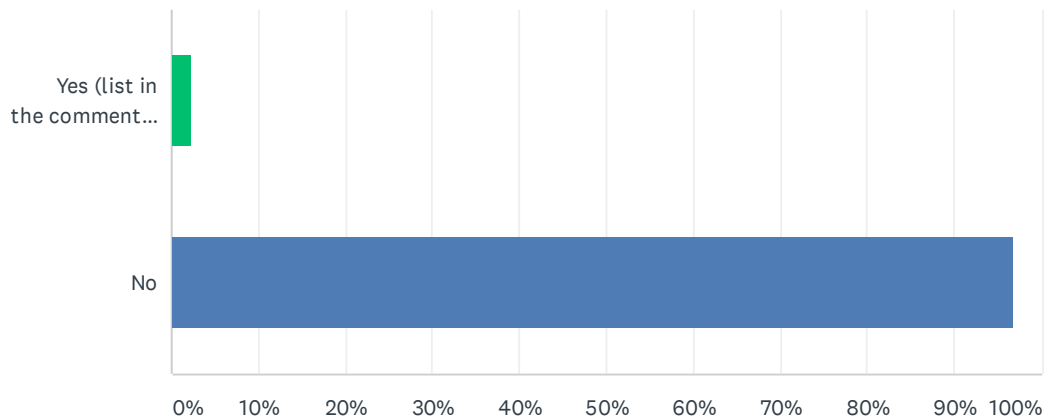

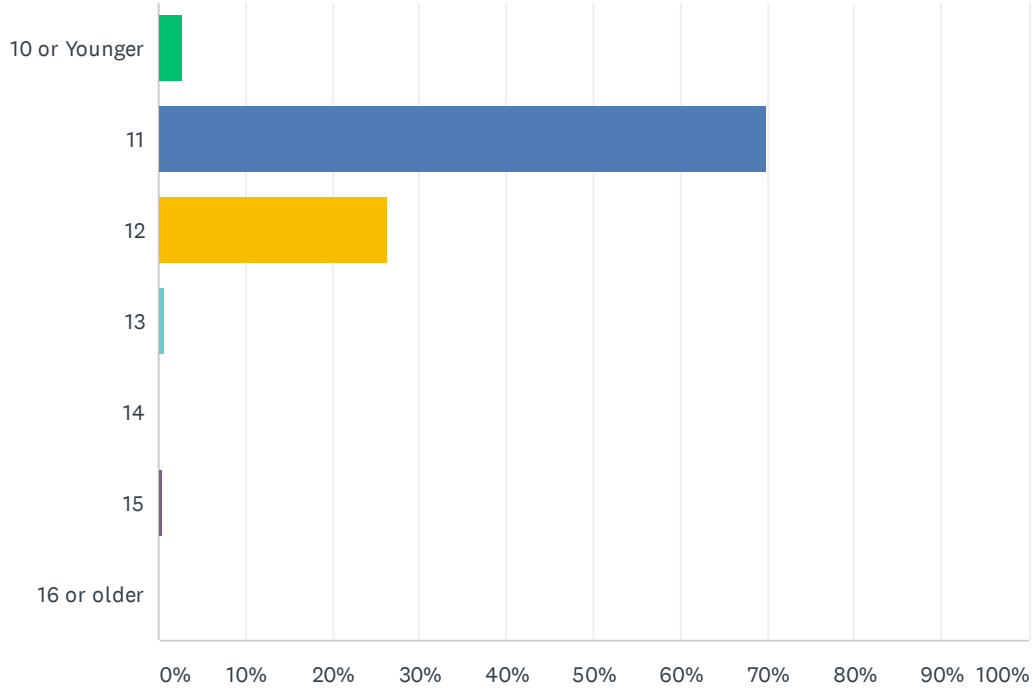
