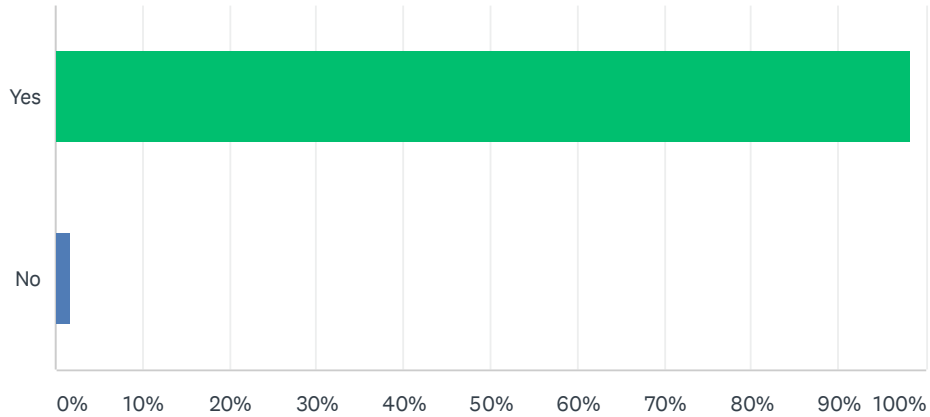


Q1 Did you participate in the reproductive health classes this year? (If your answer is no, please go directly to question #8)

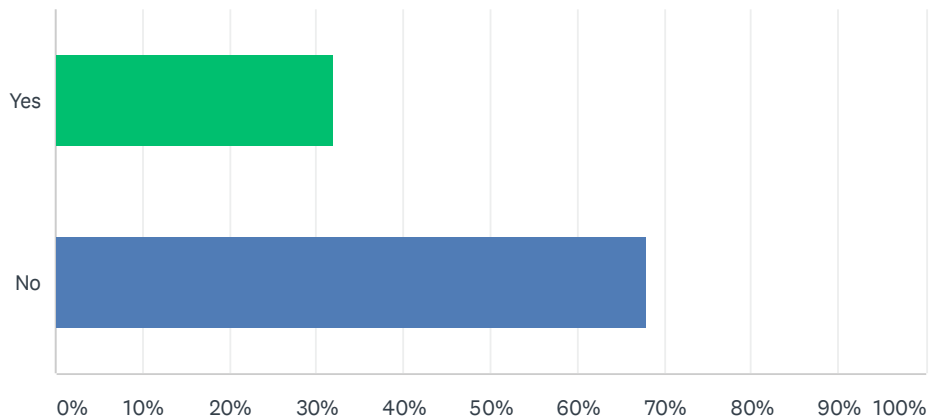

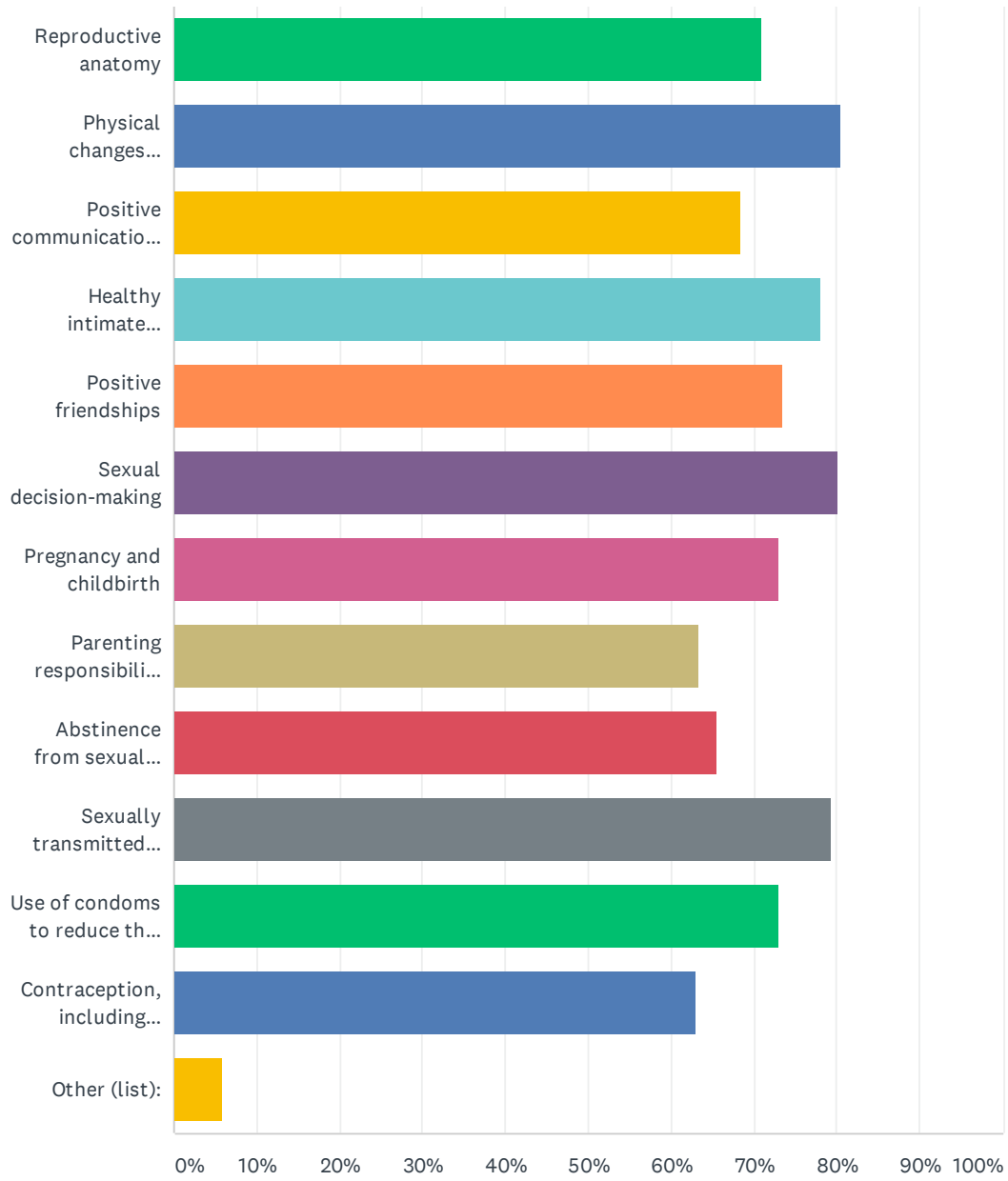

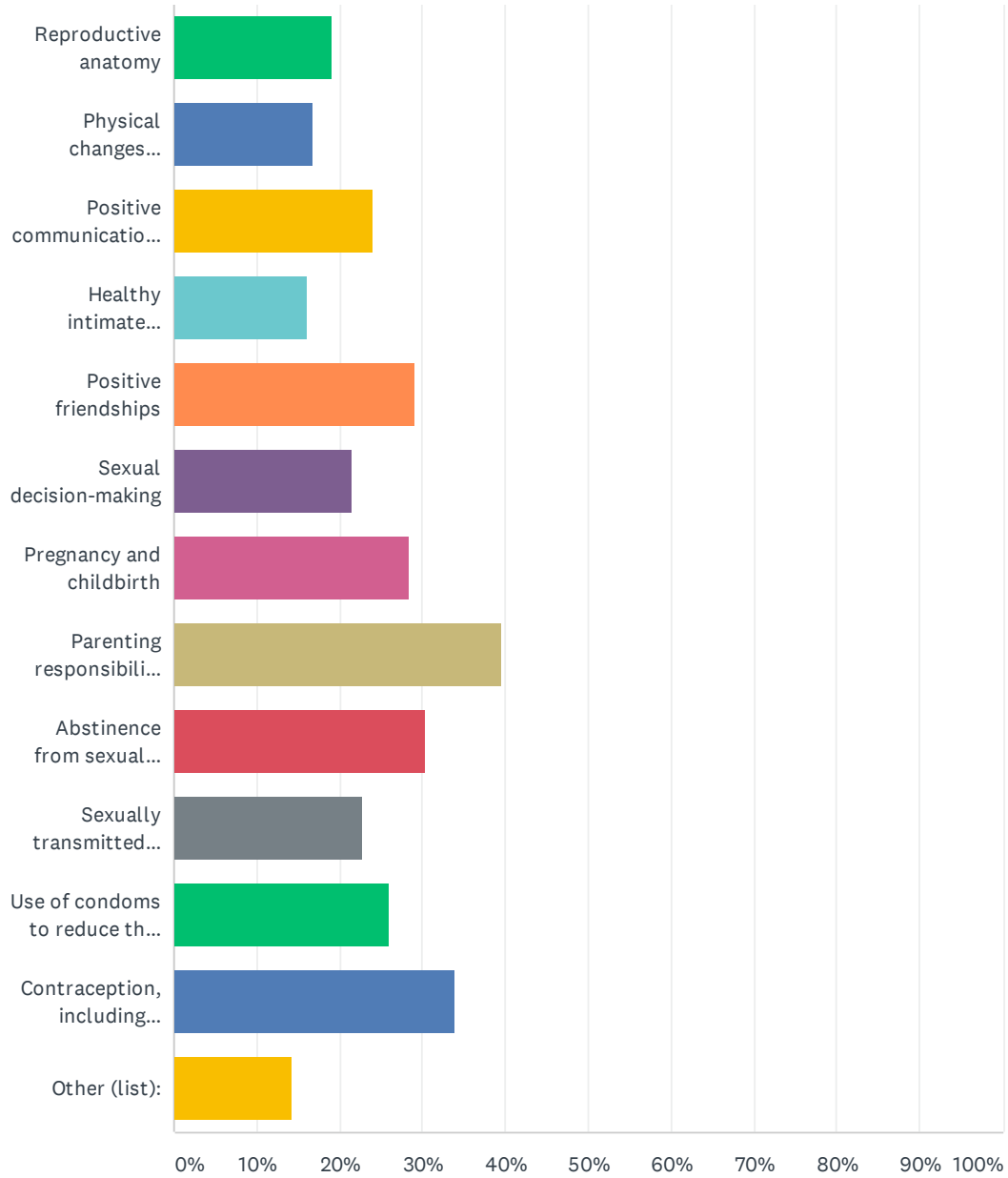

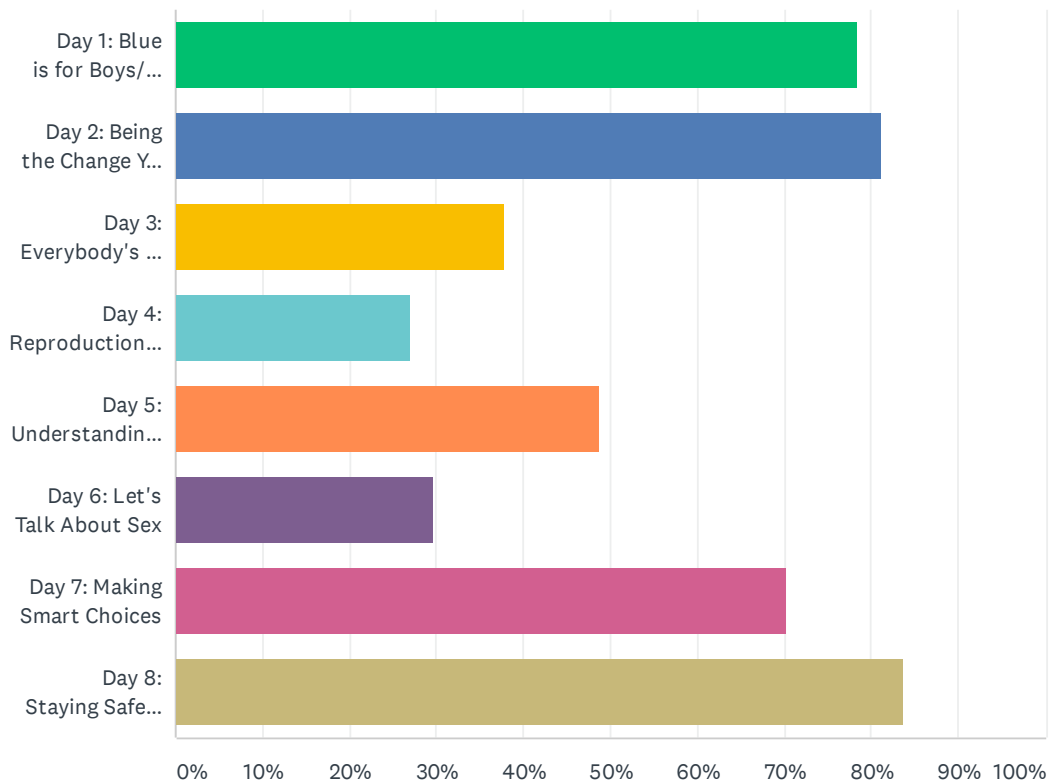

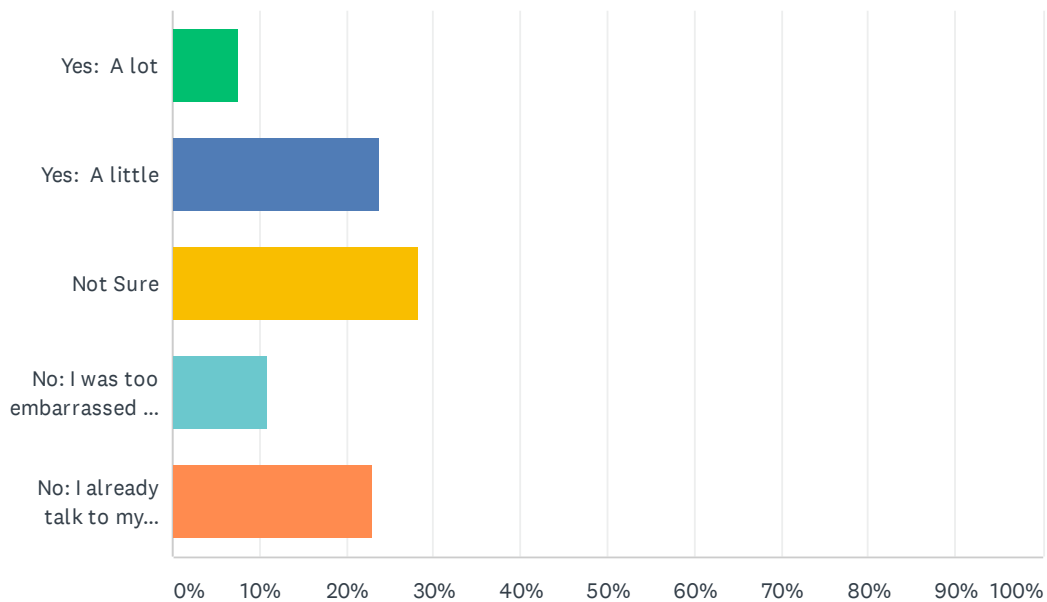

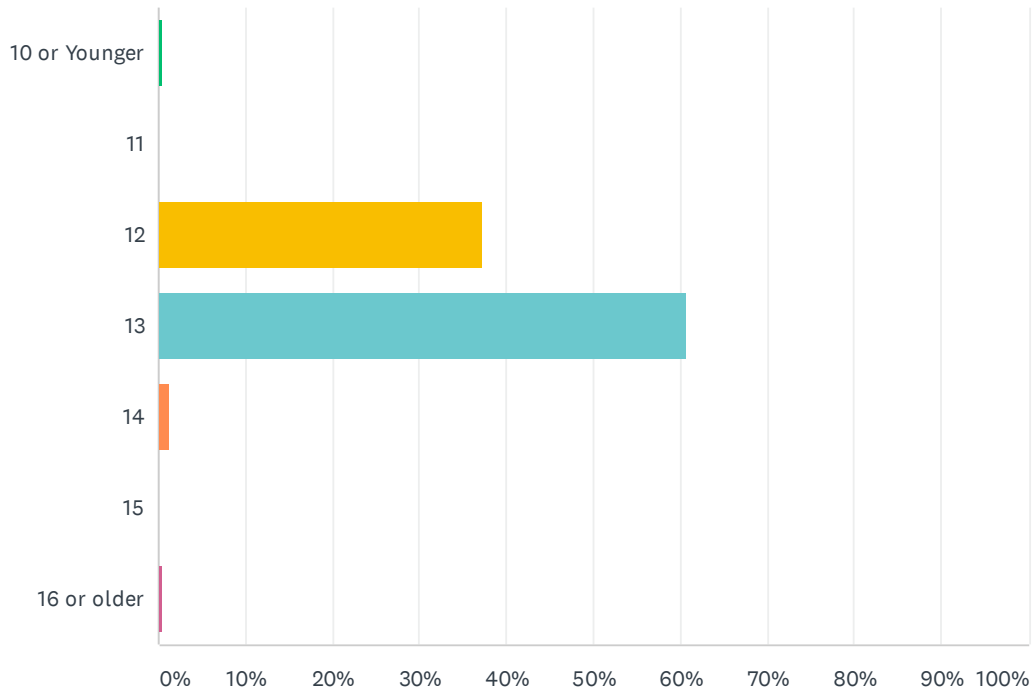

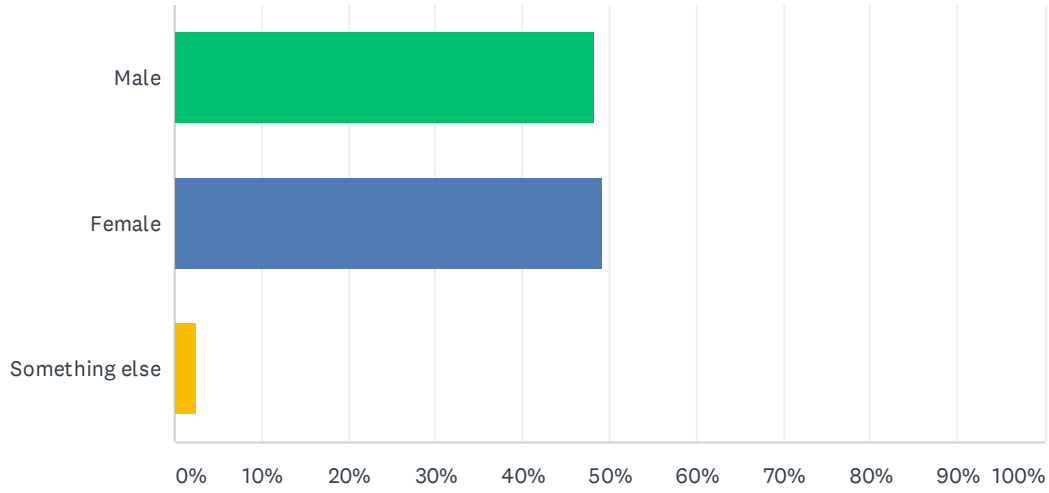
