REGULAR MEETING OF JANUARY 19, 2017

The regular meeting of the Personal Health and Sexuality Education Advisory Board was called to order by President Michele Borgialli at 7:17 p.m.

PHASE Advisory Board Members Meta Kreiner and Jessica Bermejo have resigned from their board positions and their seats will be filled for the fall of 2017.

John Hood reported on behalf of the elementary buildings. Puberty: The Wonder Years Training will be offered by Eaton County RESA on February 16, 2017 for 4th, 5th and 6th grade teachers. Kinawa Assistant Principal Andrea Hallead and Bennett Woods Physical Education Teacher Brian Kushion will also attend.

Jill Dehlin reported on behalf of Kinawa 5/6 School, Chippewa Middle School and Okemos High School. Jill will be meeting with Kinawa Physical Education Teachers during the week of January 23rd to review the curriculum that was recently approved. Jill along with John Hood, Andrea Hallead and Bob Bullock met recently to discuss the online preview of curriculum. Jill also met with Okemos High School Physical Education/Health Teacher Debby Mitchell to review the PowerPoint slides for the 9th grade curriculum. No separate reports for Special Education or Gender Inclusion Implementation of District Equity Plan.

Michele Borgialli reported on Kinawa 4th/5th/6th grade curricula. Michele and Jill and created parent summaries of the curricula at each grade level including exit ticket questions for students.

John Hood reported on the Talk Early and Talk Often Parent Program to be held on February 23, 2017. The program is currently full at 50 registrations with a running waiting list. The parent groups for Kinawa 5/6 School, Chippewa Middle School and Okemos High School will each contribute towards the cost of hosting this program. Stephanie Fleming mentioned a similar free program to be offered by Planned Parenthood on February 7, 2017 that we could also offer to parents who are on the waiting list for our program.

Jill reported on Okemos High School curricula review. Jill along with Stephanie Fleming, Stacey Tanay and Melissa Eades reviewed the PowerPoint slides the teachers utilize in their classrooms. Suggestions and changes were made and the team will continue to work on summaries. Jill Dehlin and OHS teacher Debby Mitchell would like to visit Willow Plaza, which is a clinic in Old Town Lansing that offers peer educator services.

John Hood, Jill Dehlin and Michele Borgialli reported on continuous quality improvement/curricula fidelity with a goal to provide easier access of curricula to parents and to have the ability to receive feedback as necessary. Matt Ottinger at Okemos High School is working on digitizing the videos for the curricula. John Hood will bring a sample of the communication that will go out to parents to the next meeting. Curriculum manuals are in the process of being scanned to be placed on the website with a goal to have everything available online by spring conferences (March). John spoke of having the middle school materials at parent/teacher conferences for preview and available online. The district will be moving to a new website for the upcoming school year to ensure ADA compliance and plan to provide families with the curriculum online as soon as possible. Parents will receive direct email communications from school administrators about personal health classes. Parent and student surveys will be updated to reflect commonly used answers as check box selections to help organize responses.

The PHASE board viewed as a group the HIV and AIDS video from the Okemos High School library. As a result, Jill will be researching other videos that will appeal to a teen audience.

Team Leads reported on PHASE 2016 student survey results overview. No report for 6th or 7th grade, to be reported at the next meeting. Tami Hiser reported for 8th grade and indicated a 93% response rate. The most common discussion amongst students with their parents pertained to STIs. There was an overwhelming response of students wanting updated videos and preferred to receive the curriculum at the beginning of the school year instead of at the end. Students also preferred the lessons to be presented to each gender separately and not in the gymnasium of the school. Students would also like the option to write questions on a piece of paper that can be turned in anonymously to receive answers. Stephanie Fleming reported for 9th grade. Common themes within comments from students surround LGBT issues and demonizing teen pregnancy. Students reported that they enjoyed the SMART stories and the one topic they liked the most was surrounding healthy relationships.
