FROM THE OFFICE OF DR. SLEE

January 27 was International Holocaust
Remembrance Day, and it marks the anniversary of
the liberation of Auschwitz-Birkenau, the largest Nazi
death camp. To learn more about the Holocaust, visit
the <u>United States Holocaust Memorial Museum</u>
(USHMM) website. Today, antisemitism, defined as
prejudice against or hatred of Jews, is on the rise in
the United States, and its prevalence negatively
impacts many people within our Okemos community.
The USHMM provides a <u>historical overview</u> of
antisemitism, as well as a <u>3-minute video</u> that
explains what antisemitism is.

February is Black History Month. In 1926, historian Carter G. Woodson and his organization, the Association for the Study of Negro Life and History, named the second week of February as "Negro History Week" to celebrate and honor the contributions of Black Americans to U.S. history. This week was chosen because it included the birthdays of both abolitionist Frederick Douglass and former U.S. President Abraham Lincoln. Woodson hoped that because many Black communities already celebrated these two birthdates, adding more structure and significance to the week would help extend the study of Black history. In 1976, then-President Gerald Ford broadened the event to become Black History Month. This month-long celebration is intended to promote and reinforce the learning of Black history that occurs throughout the year.

Okemos Public Schools has partnered with Child and Family Charities to provide a **mental health clinic** within Okemos High School. This opportunity is made possible because of the Expanding, Enhancing Emotional Health (E3) grant through the Michigan Department of Health and Human Services Adolescent Health Center Division. The clinic will provide on-site comprehensive mental health services from mild to moderate severity of need. There will be a full-time therapist at the OHS clinic five days a week and will be able to serve all OPS youth ages 5 to 21 years. Contact the principal if you have questions or need a referral!.
