CMU Scholarships

Applications are now open for the Leader Advancement Scholarship, the Lloyd M. Cofer Scholarship, and the Multicultural Advancement Scholarship. The first step is applying for admission.

After submitting an application for admission, eligible students will gain access to the following scholarship applications: Leader Advancement Scholarship-Rewards dedicated leaders with \$2,000 per year. Minimum 3.0 GPA required.

Multicultural Advancement/Lloyd M. Cofer Scholarships- Rewards students committed to equality and inclusion. Valued between \$4,125 annually and a full-ride. No minimum GPA required. Applications are due January 15.

Policy Spotlight: Unlawful Discrimination & Harassment

Policies at all levels help us create safe, productive, and supportive learning environments. Throughout the school year, we will highlight key policies that shape our practices.

Below are excerpts from <u>OPS Board Policy 4121.5121 - Unlawful</u> <u>Discrimination, Harassment and Retaliation Against Students</u>, which can be found on the OPS web site in the "Board of Education" section.

The district prohibits unlawful discrimination, including unlawful harassment and retaliation. The district will investigate all allegations of unlawful discrimination and will take appropriate action, including discipline, against any person who, following an investigation, is determined to have engaged in unlawful discrimination.

"Unlawful harassment" is verbal, written, or physical conduct that denigrates or shows hostility or aversion toward a student because of the student's race, color, religion, sex (including pregnancy, gender identity, or sexual orientation), national origin, disability, or any other legally protected class that has the purpose or effect of: 1. creating an intimidating, hostile, or offensive environment; or 2. unreasonably interfering with the student's ability to benefit from the district's educational programs or activities.

OKEMOS HIGH SCHOOL IS A CLOSED CAMPUS

Okemos High School is a closed campus. Our handbook states that when students leave campus, they can only return with permission from an administrator or their designee. In the case of OHS, the administrators' designee is Mrs. Rachel Gutting, head of attendance. Mrs. Gutting may allow students to return to class from an appointment if they provide a note from their doctor's office stating they were seen on that date as verification of the appointment. A student without a note may not return to campus until the next school day. Any exception must be approved by Principal Kemsley, Assistant Principal Cironi, or Assistant Principal Schmidt.

Okemos High School is a closed campus because we know that students are safest during the school day when they remain on campus. Sadly, we know many examples where students have gotten into trouble or were injured when they were off campus and intending to return. We do not want this for any of our students. That is why this policy has been in place since Okemos High School was located in the building currently known as Chippewa Middle School.

At OHS, we offer support for our students with emotional needs in both our main and counseling office. We also have free breakfast and lunch available in our cafeteria. During the school day, our expectation is that once a student arrives, they will stay on campus unless they become ill or have another type of emergency that will force them to leave campus. Beyond our limited number of students who take classes on alternative campuses, students should not come and go during the school day.

BE ON TIME AT OKEMOS HIGH SCHOOL

Okemos High School has the longest passing time in the Lansing area at 7 minutes. Students are expected to get from one class to another in this time. Students who are unable to do so may receive a detention if they earn 6 or more tardies in a single class. This is a very generous policy. 94% of our students have yet to earn a single tardy detention this year. This is outstanding.

ATTENDANCE AT OKEMOS HIGH SCHOOL

Regular school attendance is an important component of learning for students. Good attendance benefits students academically as well as socially. Group learning assists students to communicate, to gain perspectives and to accept responsibility – all important components of adulthood. Class attendance is necessary for learning and academic achievement, as well as for developing the habits of punctuality, dependability and self-discipline. Days missed from school cannot be completely recovered as the classroom experience is unique and cannot be fully replicated. We must work as a team-parents, students, teachers, and administrators-to ensure that absences are limited to necessities such as illness, family emergencies, funerals, or school-related absences.

Attending school is mandatory in Michigan. The state of Michigan defines truancy as missing 10% of days. The OPS Board policy generously places the attendance policy at approximately 17%, which translates to 15 days missed over the course a semester. Families receive a letter upon the 10th absence. A student in excess of 15 absences in a class may have their extracurricular privileges restricted.

More than anything, we want your child to make the most of this school year. We appreciate your partnership helping create good attendance habits for our students.
