Background

Background - Federal

- March 11, 2021 American Rescue Plan(ARP)signed into law
- Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief (ESSER)
 \$122 Billion allocated to schools across the United
 States
- Michigan's Allocation= \$3.7 Billion
- At least 90% of Funds <u>must</u> be allocated to districts based on Title I <u>Formula</u>

Background - State

- ESSER III Formula
 - Okemos' Allocation= \$902,352 or \$195/pupil
 - o 20% must be reserved for learning loss
 - Must receive meaningful input from community on use of funds
 - Can be spent to support <u>all</u>
- ESSER III Equalization
 - Michigan Specific
 - Additional funding to ensure received at a minimum \$1,093
 - o Okemos' allocation = \$4,105,852 or \$898/pupil
 - Must receive meaningful input from community on us of funds
 - Additional requirements

ESSER III Equalization Additional Requirements

- Mandatory Reservations
 - o 51.4% learning loss
 - o 10.3% for summer enrichment
 - 10.3% for after school
- Funds Can Only be Used to Impact:
 - Economically Disadvantaged
 - English Learners
 - Students of Color
 - Students with Disabilities
 - Homeless, foster care or migratory students

- Additional staffing (teachers, paras, aides, custodians, bus drivers, food service, substitutes)

- Clean buildings and grounds (bathrooms was noted)
- Arts and extracurriculars (clubs)
- Don't spend extra money on students in those categories
- Summer or before or after school support, tutors
- Transportation more busses and after school program transpor
- Air quality
- Food security
- Reduce class sizes
- Library materials
- Gifted consultant support
- COVID testing, tracing
- Special ed supports
- Playgrounds
- Support for diversity initiatives, PD for staff


Identified Areas for Support

Patterns/themes for Additional COVID Relief Areas

- Provide better/healthy foods
- Along with DEI, we need to teach civility
- Reduce student populations at buildings, especially elementary buildings. No extra rooms for small groups or large enough places for staff to meet safety.
- Strengthen professional development and staff supports for LGBTQ+ equity
- Summer meals so no child goes hungry
- Invest in grounds for outdoor usage
- Onsite rapid testing

- Increased social emotional supports-PD, social workers, support for students, staff, families
- Reduced class size
- Support for remote access for quarantined students
- More staff and classroom aides
- SEL teacher/specials class
- Social emotional learning dogs, clubs
- Better classroom furniture
- Teach executive function to studentsplanners
- Student population outreach

Patterns/themes for Additional COVID Relief Areas

- Socialization for kids- resume clubs from 15 years ago that were defunded, after hours & weekend sports
- Training for administrators and teachers on how to identify mental health warning signs
- Mental health community supports housed within the district
- Security
- Outdoor lunch areas
- Trauma informed teaching methods
- Mental health resources for parents
- Centralization for assessing students in need and supporting families
- Retention & incentives for staff

- Reinstate TRAILS program from U of M- established program to support social emotional needs of students
- Continue with United in Social Progress club- during and after pandemic
- Maximize public and private relationships- engage community in providing supports for students.
- Peer to peer supports, leadership development
- Engage student voice
- Parent education support person- provide parental support
- Robust extended school year for students receiving specialized services- longer hours and longer duration for the summer program
