Meeting notes from the District Parent Council meeting on October 15, 2018

John Hood report:

- 1. Monitoring overcrowding on busses. At this time, it is believed that that there is not overcrowding, however, the situation will continue to be monitored. If additional busses become necessary the administration will look into leasing busses or other options.
- 2. Nice article in the Lansing State Journal about Ira, who is involved with Okemos Athletics. Ira talks about athletics being more of a lifestyle than a job.
- 3. Dawn Reed received an award for outstanding educator recognizes both local and state level leadership. An awards banquet will be held on October 19, 2018.
- 4. Be Excellent day was at the high school last week. The topic was Health and Addiction and how to make healthy choices. Some of the speakers included recovering students, and speakers about the importance of connecting to other students through belonging, and messages of hope, joy and impacting lives.
- 5. There was a problem with the math scores of 8th graders in the 2017-2018 school year that is being corrected. New scores will be mailed out to those affected. It is not anticipated that the corrections will make much of a difference on scores.
- Achievement data: SAT: Okemos scored 3rd highest in the state (Novi and Northville were higher), but Okemos scored 3rd with 19% poverty, while Novi has about 6% poverty and Northville has about 9% poverty; In comparison to all other states, Okemos scored 17th (and this was with 100% participation other schools had much less participation)

Dean Bolton:

- The search for a new Superintendent continues there are currently three (3) remaining candidates. October 24th will be a next set of interviews at 6pm. The interviews will last one (1) hour with each candidate. Audience feedback forms will be available for those attending to watch. A copy will be posted as well.
- 2. A discussion was had about how to best get concerns to the school board. This is an ongoing challenge because it is important that the school board meetings operate to accomplish the board's agenda, but it is also important that concerns of parents and others, be addressed. Dean indicated that copies of the e-mailed concerns are given to all board members, superintendent and assistant superintendent and then a board member has to bring it up as an item for the meeting. He also indicated that he intends on looking into other ways of having dialogue with community and parents and the schools.
- 3. The bond/millage proposal for facilities committee will be discussed at the board meeting tonight. On October 22, 2018 they will have a work session, using King Scott Audit suggestions, to discuss the proposal. The discussion will be continued at the meeting on November 12, 2018 and the final language for the proposal will be decided at the meeting on November 26, 2018. This proposal will be ready for the vote on May 7, 2019.

Building reports were given. One note, one of the schools uses runsignup.com for taking donations. The fee for each donation was very small.

- High School Football Game Student Expectations: In an effort to maintain a SAFE and orderly environment at our sporting events, so that ALL fans can enjoy the games, we are asking parents/guardians to please help us in our effort by reviewing these expectations with their students before they attend a game.
 - All students through 8th grade are encouraged to attend the game with an adult.
 - Students are expected to stay within the event boundaries. At high school football games students must stay within the event boundaries defined by fences. Specifically, students are not permitted to jump fences to access the soccer field, be under the bleachers or enter Hartrick Park.
 - Always exhibit good sportsmanship:
 - Be respectful during the National Anthem, school songs, and player introductions.

- Never boo or yell at officials or opposing players.
- Cheer for your team's players.
- Represent your school in a positive manner.
- Be respectful of other students and adults attending the game.
- Please be reminded that behaviors at all Okemos School events will be addressed through the student code of conduct.
- Home Football Game Parking: Due to traffic congestion, parking in The Meadows subdivision (across the street from the OHS football field) will be restricted for each home Okemos football game. Parking will only be permitted on one side of each street, and "No Parking by Order of the Chief of Police" signs will be visible throughout the subdivision streets. The Meridian Township Police Department will be closely monitoring parking violations. For the safety of the residents and all guests, we ask that you please abide by these parking rules and use the OHS student lot for home football game parking. Thank you!

- FREE performance: October 26th Purdue marching band will be providing a FREE performance along with OHS marching band at 7 pm at the OHS football field. - Taste of Okemos is November 3rd 2pm 4pm at OHS. This is a huge fundraiser for Chippewa and OHS choir. Cost is \$15 (11 and up), \$10 (Senior Citizens and 6-10), \$5 (5 and under). Many are restaurants will be represented.
- Be Excellent Day was October 10, 2018. This is a program put on by staff during which guest speakers are brought in to talk to the student body. The theme for this year's *Be Excellent Day* program is "Make a Difference!" An emphasis for the program will focus on how students can make a difference in their school, their community and the world by taking a closer look at the journey of each speaker. In brief, Alexa Score motivated students to be change agents, Phil Pavona shared his son's battle with addiction and opiates, and Jackson Kaguri empowered students through his story of becoming a 2012 CNN Hero through his work with AIDS orphans in Uganda. - SAT Comparison of Top Ten SAT Composite Scores in Michigan: Okemos ranks #3 overall in the state of Michigan for the highest composite score on the 2017-18 SAT. Free and reduced lunch status is often an indicator of lower academic achievement, and of the ten highest scoring schools, Okemos had the third highest free and reduced lunch percentage at 19.2%.
