December Character Trait


Respect

DEI Tidbits

Checking Our Biases: Ableism & Ageism

Ableism is "a set of beliefs or practices that devalue and discriminate against people with physical, intellectual, or psychiatric disabilities and often rests on the assumption that disabled people need to be 'fixed' in one form or the other" (Center for Disability Rights). Examples of ableism include: choosing an inaccessible venue for an event, framing a disability as tragic or inspiring, and talking to a person with a disability like they are a child, among many others. Phrases like "That's so lame," "That guy is crazy," and "It's like the blind leading the blind" are ableist, implying that a disability makes a person "less than" and that disability is bad.

Ageism is prejudice or discrimination based on a person's age, much of it directed toward older people because of negative and inaccurate stereotypes. Examples of ageism include jokes about old people, accusing an older person of acting too young and denying a person a promotion because of their age, among many others. Phrases like "You look good for your age," "Are you having a senior moment?" "Hey old man," and "Okay boomer" are ageist, often pitting younger people against older people. Read about the negative effects of ageism on the American Psychological Association website.
